Highlights

- Achieved a second 5 year Accreditation from InformUSA
- Received a National Innovation Award for our work with United Way of Midland County and the LIFT Program
- 50% of all 211 staff are Inform USA Certified
- 56% of all staff are Certified Health Workers
- Received \$75,000 ARPA grant to set up and test a system that would help Midland County residents navigate mental health options better with the goal of getting people connected to the support they need and identifying barriers











Number of events attended:

- Over 50 events attended in almost every one of our counties
 - Community Connect events
 - Trunk or treats
 - Community Baby Showers
- About 130 community meetings attended throughout the year
- Dow Invitational with nearly 10,000 people (and we put stickers on almost all of them!)
- Duck Derby event in Bay City
- Outreach Day in Midland County where we posted over 100 posters and 1000 cards to people promoting LIFT
- Food giveaway with 2000 people affected in Tuscola County
- United Way kick off event in losco County



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

Unmet Needs


- Sometimes we are unable to make a referral because of these reasons:
 - That referral doesn't exist
 - That organization has run out of funds to support that service at that time
 - The client can't access the referral due to a number of possible barriers including transportation, technology access and language

In 2023, 18% of needs presented by our callers went unmet for these and other reasons.




Unmet Needs

- **669** unmet needs related to Homelessness and Shelter needs
- **1164** unmet needs related to Electric Service Payment Assistance
- **1182** unmet needs for Rent Payment and Rental Deposit Assistance



Demographics/Contact Markers



- From 2023 we saw a significant increase in the number of people calling who already had food stamps (from 29% to 47%) as well as increases in the number of caller over 50 and those who are receiving Social Security Disability benefits.
- COVID-19 inquires have virtually disappeared.

LIFT (Leveraging Income For Tomorrow)

- The LIFT Program works with the ALICE population (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) in Midland County, an esteemed 35% of residents.
- The program help to "fill in the gaps" when an individual or family no longer qualifies for government benefits but doesn't make enough to meet all of their basic needs.





LIFT (Leveraging Income For Tomorrow) 2023 Impact

- Total number of people assisted: 572
- Amount of Assistance Given: \$322,804.61
- Greatest Needs:
 - Rent Payment/Rental Deposit Assistance
 - Appliance Vouchers
